<u>Program Vision: An</u> ambitious picture for the future of the academic program to be a sophisticated, inspiring, stimulating, realistic and applicable program.

<u>Program Mission:</u> Briefly outlines the objectives and activities necessary to achieve them and defines the program's development paths and directions.

Program Objectives: They are statements that describe what the academic program intends to achieve within a specific period of time and are measurable

and observable.

**Curriculum Structure:** All courses / subjects included in the academic program according to the approved learning system (semester, yearly, Bologna track) whether it is a requirement (ministry, university, college and scientific department)

with the number of study units.

**Learning Outcomes:** A compatible set of knowledge, skills and values acquired by the student after the successful completion of the academic program and must determine the learning outcomes of each course in a way that achieves the

objectives of the program.

Teaching and learning strategies: They are the strategies used by the faculty member to develop the student's teaching and learning, and they are plans that are followed to reach the learning goals. Describeall classroom and extracurricular activities to achieve the learning outcomes of the program.
